Why use social media to share published research? (part 1)

- More informal way of communicating
- Rapid response
- Enables people to comment on and share research
- Reveals research that people might not find otherwise





Why use social media to share published research? (part 2)

- Connects with people around the world
- Demonstrates research impact in a new way (new metrics look at social media engagement)
- Other researchers are doing it
- It's easy





How do you get started?

- Set up an account e.g. with twitter.com, www.facebook.com, linkedin.com
- They can be linked together so that Twitter automatically populates Facebook and LinkedIn
- (There are other social media channels.
 You probably can't do all of them so best to focus on one or two)





How do you use it? (part 1)

- Tweets can be up to 140 characters in length (including links)
- Some journals ask authors to do tweetable abstracts or titles (very short summaries of their work that can be tweeted)
- Include a web link/DOI to your paper
- Include Twitter names of relevant people
- Follow relevant people





How do you use it? (part 2)

- Use hashtags, especially of popular search topics
- Tie in hashtags with other things going on in social media (e.g. World Wildlife Day)
- Facebook is very similar, except that it doesn't have the character limit. Facebook is particularly effective for gaining engagement if you are sharing photos





How do you use it? (part 3)

- Be consistent about what you tweet about
- Keep your institution, potential collaborators, other researchers in your field etc. informed about what you are doing by tweeting things to them
- Keep @INASPinfo informed about what you are doing so that we can retweet





Monitor social media activity

- Some journals platforms track social media engagement
- You can also begin tracking analytics.twitter.com when you set up an account
- On Facebook, you can track the traffic and engagement using the 'Insight' tab
