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

AuthorAID (<u>www.authoraid.info</u>): A Brief Introduction

- A project mainly to help researchers in developing countries to write about and publish their work
- Has multiple interrelated components (workshops and courses, mentorship, blog, resource library, etc)
- Based at INASP (<u>www.inasp.info</u>), an international development charity in Oxford, UK



AuthorAID Beneficiaries: Some Vignettes



Psychiatry Researcher in Somalia



- Wishes to publish findings but is unsure how to proceed
- Using AuthorAID
 website, learns how to
 write and publish
 journal articles
- Within 2 years, has multiple papers accepted

Demographer in Kenya



- Wants to improve writing skills
- AuthorAID mentor gives guidance in accessing literature, analyzing data, interpreting results, writing papers, and responding to reviewers' comments
- Result: publications

Physicist in Nepal



- At AuthorAID workshop learns how to approach editor about worrisome requested revision
- Goes on to facilitate
 AuthorAID workshops
 himself
- Receives AuthorAID travel grant to speak at conference

Researcher in Ethiopia



- Has 2 papers accepted contingent on editorial revision
- For each, obtains
 assistance from an
 editor volunteering as
 an AuthorAID mentor
- Both papers published soon thereafter

Origins and Operations



AuthorAID: Some History

- Concept from Phyllis Freeman and Anthony Robbins (editors, Journal of Public Health Policy)
- Carefully monitored pilot phase 2007–2009
- Full operation since
- Increasing emphasis on embedding the activities in developing countries
- Main sources of funding: Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) and UK Department for International Development (DFID)



Volunteers: Crucial to AuthorAID

- Mentors: researchers and editors helping developing-country authors
- Others—for example, individuals who
 - Translate AuthorAID materials into their native languages
 - Provide or suggest materials for the AuthorAID resource library
 - Write guest posts for the AuthorAID blog

Main Components of AuthorAID



AuthorAID Components: An Interrelated Array

- On-site and online instruction
- Mentoring
- Online community
 - Blog
 - Resource library
 - Email discussion list
- Small grants to give workshops, provide online courses, present at conferences, etc

On-Site Workshops

- Focus largely on writing and publishing journal articles or writing grant proposals
- Initially a few per year, led by AuthorAID
 - Sometimes in partnership with publishers or others
 - Typically 2 to 5 days
 - With local co-facilitators
 - Train-the-trainer aspect
 - Presentations available in AuthorAID resource library
- Now considerably more workshops, mainly locally led by embedding partners



Online Courses: An Increasing Emphasis of AuthorAID

- Pilot tested in 2011 at National University of Rwanda
- Moodle platform used
- Main offering: 5-week course on research writing
- Also, for example,
 - Spanish-language version of this course
 - Course on writing grant proposals
- Course in late 2015: more than 1,000 participants
- Embedding partners now providing some instruction via their own Moodle sites



AuthorAID Mentoring




Some Topics on Which AuthorAID Mentors Sometimes Provide Guidance

- Using appropriate research methods
- Doing data analysis
- Choosing suitable journals
- Writing articles
- Responding to reviewers' comments
- Preparing presentations and posters
- Writing grant proposals

Needed: More Mentors

- In total, about 11,000 registrants on AuthorAID website as of late 2015
- (Also can use website without registering)
- About 6,800 self-identified as prospective mentees
- Fewer than 300 self-identified as prospective mentors




The AuthorAID Online Community




AuthorAID Blog

- On research communication
- Archived since its origin in 2007
- At least 2 posts per week
 - General post (wide range of topics)
 - Tip of the week
- Spanish-language version of AuthorAID website: includes Spanish translations of posts




AuthorAID Resource Library

- As of late 2015, about 700 items
- About 500 in English; others in Arabic, Chinese,
 French, Persian, Portuguese, Spanish, or Vietnamese
- Presentations, articles, Web links, and more
- Many aspects of research communication represented
- Can search by topic, resource type, or language



AuthorAID Email Discussion List

- On Dgroups
- Began in 2009
- Archived
- Often lively discussion
 - In response to researchers' inquiries
 - In response to scenarios posted by AuthorAID project team member



AuthorAID Small Grants



AuthorAID Small Grants

- For candidates from developing countries
- Available since 2011
- Highly competitive
- Main categories
 - To give workshops on research communication
 - To travel to conferences where presentations have been accepted
 - To give online courses
 - Gender grants




AuthorAID Travel Grant Recipient from Nepal (2014)

 - Providing ideas for further developing AuthorAID


Some Potential Areas for Further Partnering
