





Communicate your research and advance your career

Writing your first journal articles can be especially difficult if you have little or no local guidance. This is where AuthorAID can help, Our aim is to help early-career researchers contact experienced researchers and editors in order to get help with:

- Using appropriate research methods and performing data analysis
- Choosing appropriate journals for submitting manuscripts
- · Preparing manuscripts
- Refining writing style
- . Understanding the peer review process and responding to reviewers' comments
- · Preparing presentations and posters
- Preparing grant proposals
- Otherwise communicating about research

Information for Mentees

How might I benefit from mentoring?

AuthorAID mentors are experienced researchers and editors, and they are encouraged to be supportive and helpful. Mentors can give you both specific and general information about writing, publishing, and research. You may ask them the smallest of questions, seek large-scale guidance from them about research directions and potential grants, and everything in between. Their knowledge can be very valuable.

How does the mentoring process work?

The first step is to register online with AuthorAID. During registration, you can create a short profile about your research, and you can say what sort of help and advice you would like.

Then you may either (1) be contacted by mentors who are already AuthorAID members or (2) use the Find Researchers page to locate and contact potential mentors.

Once you have contacted a potential mentor, you can start discussions (for example, via AuthorAID's own messaging system or more informally via instant messaging, e-mail, telephone calls, or Skype calls). If both members agree to start a mentoring relationship, you can decide whether to set up a formal learning agreement.

What we expect from mentees

We expect mentors and mentees to show mutual respect and to maintain confidentiality where necessary. Also, before showing

Become an AuthorAID mentor

Make a difference - sign up to become an AuthorAID mentor

Many early-career researchers struggle as they make their way through the submission and peer review process the first time. The process can be especially difficult if no guidance is available nearby, or if the submission isn't in the researcher's native language. This is where an AuthorAID mentor can really help make a difference.

What sort of mentors are AuthorAID looking for?

We're looking for experienced researchers with a strong track record of publications. We're also seeking editors who have helped researchers write journal articles and proposals. Potential mentors should be diplomatic, enthusiastic, and committed. They should be able to guide and encourage early-career researchers, and they should be ready to focus on furthering the mentee's career, not their own.

What skills do mentors need?

We need mentors who can provide help with some or all of the following:

- Using appropriate research methods and performing data analysis
- · Choosing appropriate journals for submitting manuscripts
- Preparing manuscripts
- · Refinina writina style
- · Understanding the peer review process and responding to reviewers' comments
- Preparing presentations and posters
- · Preparing grant proposals
- · Otherwise communicating about research

What does mentoring involve?

Mentoring involves communicating regularly with your mentee—for example, responding to queries or requests within agreed timeframes. It entails patience and mutual respect for each other's time and ideas. More details appear in our Quick Guidelines for Mentors (PDF, 23K)

How does the mentoring process work?

The first step is to register online with AuthorAID. During registration, you can create a short profile about your research interests and publications or about your editorial experience.

Some Statistics

- 4500 registrants, in 161 countries
 - Of these, 640 are mentors
 - 3126 are mentees
 - So there is help out there but we need more mentors
- From February 2011 to February 2012, a total of 77,140 visits from 35,542 visitors in 184 countries/territories





Workshops on Research Writing





The Workshops

- Several per year
- In developing countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America
- Focus largely on
 - Writing and publishing journal articles
 - Preparing poster presentations and oral presentations
 - Writing grant proposals





The Workshops (cont)

- Typically 2 to 5 days
- Sometimes held in conjunction with partners or conferences (e.g. IADSR!)
- Combine lectures and small-group work
- Serve researchers from varied disciplines
- Often have local co-facilitators
 - Help relate content to local context
 - Learn to give the workshops themselves





The Workshops (cont)

- Encourage attendees to share the learning
- Increasingly followed by train-the-trainer workshops
- Facilitators and trainees have gone on to give multiple workshops
- Also help in publicizing AuthorAID, assessing needs, and testing materials





Online Course in Research Writing

- Developed by Ravi Murugesan, AuthorAID training coordinator
- Based on the AuthorAID workshops
- Pilot-tested at the National University of Rwanda in autumn 2011
- Expected to become openly available soon





Resource Library

- Contains presentations (e.g. from AuthorAID workshops), articles, book chapters, Web links, etc.—thus far, nearly 500 items in all
- Searchable by subject area, language, and medium
- Includes translations of some materials into Arabic, Chinese, French, Portuguese, Spanish, or Vietnamese; more languages sought



Attending a Large Conference: Some Tips

Greetings again. I hope you're doing well.

In a few days, some of my students and I will attend the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) <u>annual meeting</u>. It will be in Vancouver, Canada.

The AAAS annual meeting is a large conference. Thousands of researchers, from many countries, attend it. There are many sessions at the same time.

Attending such a large conference can be wonderful but overwhelming. How can one make the most of such an opportunity? Here are some tips, mainly for those new to attending such conferences.

- If possible, look at the conference program before attending. List sessions you hope to attend.
- Take advantage of the chance to network.
 - · Attend conference events such as receptions.
 - Bring business cards. If you're seeking a job or other opportunity, also bring copies of your CV.
 - Consider contacting people beforehand about getting together at the conference.
- If you'll be presenting at the conference:
 - Carry your presentation materials with you. If traveling by plane, don't put them in your checked luggage, which might be delayed or lost.
 - Bring a backup copy of your presentation materials. For example, if your PowerPoint presentation is on a USB drive, also e-mail it to yourself.
 - Publicize your session to people who might like to attend.

Speaking of which . . . A <u>session</u> at the AAAS meeting will include a presentation about AuthorAID. If you attend the meeting, I hope to see you there.

Visitors to SLJOL

Fig. 1 shows visitors on a daily basis. The highest daily usage of 608 occurred on 28th March 2011. There have been periods of increased use and periods of decline during the year which may correspond to university terms.




Fig. 2: Unique visitors to SLJOL 1 Jan - 31 Dec Total 68, 133




Fig. 3: Unique visitors to SLJOL by quarter - total 137,652

The number of unique visitors to the site by month shows a dip in the middle of the year but this improved at the end of the year (Fig. 2). There were 68,133 unique visitors during the year. Fig. 3 shows that the decline in visitors during 2011 was the first time that visitor numbers have declined but they soon recovered at the end of the year to a new high. There have been a total of 137,652 unique visitors altogether.




Fig. 5: Location of visitors from India - 16,997 from 84 cities

Google Analytics shows that from 1 January - 31 December 2011, there have been 111, 235 visitors from 198 countries (Fig. 4). The top three sources for visitors remain as: Sri Lanka (28,557 from 7 cities), India (16,997 from 84 cities, Fig. 5), USA (10,396 from 2,261 cities, Fig. 6) and the UK (5,638 from 451 cities).
